1. Telfair Academy	Designed by British architectural prodigy William Jay in the neoclassical Regency style, the Telfair Academy is a former mansion built from 1818-1819 for Alexander Telfair, son of Revolutionary War patriot and Georgia governor Edward Telfair. The Telfair Academy contains two nineteenth-century period rooms and houses nineteenth- and twentieth-century American and European art from the museum's permanent collection including paintings, works on paper, sculpture, and decorative arts.	121 Barnard Street	
2. Jepson Center	Devoted to the art of today, the contemporary Jepson Center links Telfair's future with its past, unifying the museum's three distinct sites.	207 York Street	
3. Owens-Thomas House	Considered by architectural historians to be one of the finest examples of English Regency architecture in America. A National Historic Landmark, the stately former residence is now a historic house museum. It boasts a decorative arts collection comprised primarily of Owens family furnishings, along with American and European objects dating from 1750-1830. Georgia State Railroad Museum	Savannah's Central of Georgia Railway National Landmark District is the oldest and most complete antebellum railroad manufacturing and repair facility still in existence in the United States. The Georgia State Railroad Museum now has permanent exhibits in seven of the 13 structures on the site. Exhibits focus on steam engines, belt-driven machinery, locomotives, railroad rolling stock, and model railroad layouts. Ships Of The Sea Maritime Museum	Ships of the Sea Maritime Museum, founded in 1966, exhibits ship models, paintings and maritime antiques, principally from the great era of Atlantic trade and travel between England and America during the 18th and 19th centuries. The Museum's Collection is housed in the elegant home built for William Scarbrough, one of the principal owners of the Steamship Savannah and president of the Savannah Steamship Company. Massie Heritage Center	In 1841, Peter Massie left a \$5,000 bequest to the City of Savannah "for the education of the poor children." Massie Common School House was constructed on Calhoun Square in the Greek Revival architectural style. Massie opened in 1856 as Savannah's first free public school, ten years before there was a state charter for public education. Green-Meldrim House	An ornate house-museum in Savannah's Historic District that served as General Sherman's headquarters while he was in Savannah. The Green-Meldrim House is one of the finest examples of Gothic Revival architecture to be found in the South. The house was constructed in the early 1850's as the residence of Mr. Charles Green. The house has been owned by only two families and St John's Church. After the death of Mr. Green in 1881, it became the property of his son, Edward Moon Green. On Jul 14, 1892, the house was purchased by Judge Peter W. Meldrim. 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Juliette Gordon Low Birthplace	Juliette Gordon Low, the founder of the Girl Scouts, lived in this Regency-style house. A National Historic Landmark, the Wayne-Gordon House, completed in 1821, is an outstanding example of Regency architecture. Saved from demolition by the Girl Scouts, the house has been returned to its 1886 glory. Authentically furnished with family pieces and 19th-century decorative art, the room arrangements and collections interpret the life-style of a fascinating Savannah family.	10 East Oglethorpe Ave, Savannah	Adults: \$15
Davenport House Museum	Located on Columbia Square, the Isaiah Davenport House was built between 1815 and 1820 and is an exceptionally fine example of Federal architecture. It was the proposed demolition of this home that served as a catalyst in the founding of the Historic Savannah Foundation. The Andrew Low House	The Andrew Low House preserves one of the finest collections of period furnishings relating to the history of Savannah and the Low family. The lovely brick home combines Grecian details with elements of the Italian Villa style and boasts one of Savannah's most stunning ironwork balconies. A shuttered piazza overlooks a beautiful brick-walled garden in the rear of the home. The front garden remains much as it did when first planted, with two hourglass-shaped flowerbeds. Handsome inside as well as the out, the Andrew Low House features spacious rooms decorated with beautiful plaster cornices and carved woodwork. After her marriage to William Low, Juliette Low lived in this house, and it was here where she actually founded the Girl Scouts.	329 Abercorn St, Savannah	Tours are offered on the hour and half-hour daily. First Girl Scout Headquarters Building	The First Girl Scout Headquarters building, formerly the carriage house for Juliette Low's adult home, was willed to the Girl Scouts of Savannah, GA, Inc. upon Juliette's death in 1927. The building was in continuous use for Girl Scout Troop activities, adult training, and administrative offices from 1912 until 1985. The Junior League of Savannah leased the building while the Council determined how it could be utilized best. On January 15, 1996 the First Headquarters building reopened to the public as a Girl Scout museum, program center and Council shop. On March 1, 2003 the First Headquarters Program Activity Center opened. 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<p>The Mercer Williams House Museum</p>	<p>The Mercer House was designed by New York architect John S. Norris for General Hugh W. Mercer, great grandfather of Johnny Mercer. Construction of the house began in 1860, was interrupted by the Civil War and was later completed, circa 1868, by the new owner, John Wilder. In 1969, Jim Williams, one of Savannah's earliest and most dedicated private extortionists, bought the then vacant house and began a two-year restoration. <p>Cathedral of St. John the Baptist</p>	<p>The Cathedral of St. John the Baptist is a Roman Catholic cathedral. It is the Mother Church of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Savannah. The colonial charter of Savannah prohibited Roman Catholics from settling in Savannah. The English trustees feared that Catholics would be more loyal to the Spanish authorities in Florida than to the English government in Georgia. French Catholic émigrés established the first church in 1799. Construction began on the Cathedral in 1873 and was completed with the addition of the spires in 1896. The structure was nearly destroyed by fire in 1898 but through diligent effort was rebuilt by 1899.</p>	<p>222 E. Harris Street, Savannah</p>	
<p>Congregation Mickve Israel - The Third Oldest Jewish Congregation in America</p>	<p>On July 11, 1733, just five months after General James Edward Oglethorpe established the colony of Georgia, forty-two brave pioneering Jews, the "largest group of Jews to land in North America in Colonial days" arrived in Savannah. These founders of Mickve Israel brought with them a "Safertoro" [sic] made of deerskin, with two "cloaks," and a "circumcision box," which was donated by a London merchant. This Torah is still used on commemorative occasions at Mickve Israel. On March 1, 1876, the cornerstone was laid for the present building, and the Monterey Square sanctuary was consecrated on April 11, 1878. 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St. John's Church	St. John's is a parish of the Episcopal Diocese of Georgia. The church was formed in 1841. The present Church, designed in a Gothic Revival style, was consecrated on May 7th, 1853. A west annex (1881) now houses Choir Rooms, Church office and a Chapel dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Green-Meldrim Mansion was purchased in 1943 for use as Parish House and Rectory.	1 W Macon St, Savannah	912-232-1251
St. Paul's Greek Orthodox Church	The first Greek Orthodox Church in Savannah was organized around 1900 but did not receive its charter until 1907. In that year a church building was purchased from the St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Deciding not to change the name they continued services under the name of St. Paul's Greek Orthodox Church. On August 25th, 1941, the St. Paul's Parish purchased the Lawton Memorial Building from the City of Savannah. A two year program of renovation was undertaken to transform the structure into a beautiful house of worship.	14 West Anderson Street, Savannah	912-236-8256
First African Baptist Church	First African Baptist Church was organized in 1773 under the leadership of Reverend George Leile. Under the leadership of the 3rd Pastor Reverend Andrew C. Marshall, the congregation obtained the property where the present sanctuary stands. Marshall also organized the first black Sunday school in North America and changed the name of the church from "First Colored Baptist" to "First African Baptist". The sanctuary was completed in 1859 under the direction of the 4th Pastor Reverend William J. Campbell. The sanctuary still contains many of the historical elements that have allowed the congregation to preserve much of its rich history. The ceiling of the church is in the design of a "Nine Patch Quilt" which represented that the church was a safe house for slaves. Nine Patch Quilts also served as a map and guide informing people where to go next or what to look out for during their travel. Beneath the lower auditorium floor is another finished subfloor which is known as the "Underground Railroad". There is 4ft of height between both floors. SCAD Museum of Art	A contemporary art and design museum conceived and designed expressly to enrich the educational milieu of SCAD students and professors, and to attract and delight visitors from around the world. From time to time, there are concerts held at Forsyth to the benefit of the public. Fort Pulaski National Monument	Huge brick fort, construction began in 1829. Wooden pilings were sunk up to 70 feet (21.3 m) into the mud to support an estimated 25,000,000 bricks. Fort Pulaski was finally completed in 1847 following eighteen years of construction and nearly \$1 million in construction costs. National Museum of the Mighty Eighth Air Force	On January 28, 1942, fifty-three days after the infamous attack on Pearl Harbor, the 8th Air Force was officially activated in the National Guard Armory on Bull Street in Savannah, Georgia. The Museum honors the men and women who helped defeat Nazi aggression by serving in or supporting the greatest air armada the world had ever seen—the 8th Air Force. Today the gardens contain around 100 bamboo taxa, said to be the largest bamboo collection open to the public in North America. 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Ardsley Park	This large residential area was laid out in grids with squares, similar to the plan used in downtown Savannah by Gen. James Edward Oglethorpe, founder of the colony. The northern and western boundaries of Ardsley Park were marked at Estill Avenue n/k/a Victory Drive and Bull Street by an impressive looking retaining wall made of Belgian block similar to those used as ballast on ships sailing from England. At key intersections stone pillars with Spanish-looking tile roofs marked the entrances to the park. Ardsley Park was designed with tree-planting strips, or tree lawns, between the streets and sidewalks. In 1985, Ardsley Park was named to the National Register of Historic Places.
